Dear Sir

This is my submission to the state review of the moratorium on genetically engineered food crops.

PLEASE do NOT lift the moratorium on GE food crops. I have trouble enough as it is in making sure I can obtain clean organic food. You see I am a "canary" and I know of many others like me. I am allergic to many foods and pesticides. My health and that of many others depends on Australia's ability to keep a viable organic industry. Otherwise I suffer from debilitating diarrhoea. I can't smell the difference, taste the difference or see the difference between organic food and conventional food but my body reacts violently if the food is contaminated. If you introduce GE crops you will not be able to guarantee GE free organics and you will not be able to guarantee a rogue gene cross contamination of say another plant, maybe a weed, and what about extra use of roundup? I have read research material from the Pasteur Institute in France re roundup and its effects on the replicating cell and the research does not make me feel confident about roundups long term effects on the human cells. Surely a fast growing organic industry offers a bright economic and sustainable future for Australia. We have the opportunity of exporting organics to a world wide growing market why destroy this opportunity and at the same time destroy the health of those who rely on this market.

Consumers don't want GE

Polls consistently show that the majority of Australians don't want to eat GE food. The same is true for our major export markets such as Japan and Europe.

Contamination is inevitable and segregation impossible A Western Australian Parliamentary inquiry into genetic engineering formed the view that 'contamination of non-GM crops by GM crops is inevitable, segregation is not practical and that identity preservation can be achieved, but at a significant cost.' The lifting of the GE food crop ban would result in the inevitable contamination of our fields and our foods with GE canola, as has already occurred in Canada.

GE crops will not benefit farmers

In a recent report, Nuffield scholar Andrew Broad estimated that genetically engineered (GE) Roundup Ready canola would cost \$27.82 per hectare more to grow than conventional canola. He claimed that this would be compensated for if there was a yield gain of 4%, not taking into account the additional costs of segregation and identity preservation. However, a review by the Australian Productivity Commission concluded that Canadian GE canola varieties have only shown a 1% increase in yield. This increase is likely to be quickly eroded by problems of herbicide resistance.

GE crops will harm non-GE farmers Currently, non-GE farmers are expected to bear many, if not most, of the costs of introducing genetically engineered (GE) crops. The Australian Bureau of Resource Economics (ABARE) has estimated that the introduction of GE canola will cost non-GE farmers 5-15% of the farmgate value of their crop. Non-GE farmers will also be exposed to increased financial risk, including potential liability and lost market access, when the inevitable contamination occurs.

GE crops will risk markets

Australian farmers currently receive premiums and preferential market access for their canola because of its GE-free status. These premiums would be lost if GE canola were grown - and our valuable export markets, such as Japan and Europe, would be put at risk.

GE crops cannot be recalled

Once GE crops are released into the environment they cannot be recalled. As living organisms they can reproduce and pollute indefinitely.

The introduction of GE canola to Australia would result in unacceptable risks to our farmers and markets, to say nothing of the risk to our health and the environment. I strongly urge you to recommend the extension of the state GE food crop moratorium by 5 years and the labelling of all GE food, including oils and products from animals fed GE feed.
